

Program Topics for 2nd Quarter

March 3: Sheila Shearer gave an interesting presentation on her recent trip to Japan as part of the Friendship Force Program. Her pictures showed a great deal about life in Japan as she was hosted by two different families and was able to see many interesting things in the country.

April 3: The program was "CERTIFICATES, REGISTRATIONS AND OTHER DOCUMENTS – WHAT'S IN IT FOR YOU?" Have you found or applied for a document with certain expectations and been surprised at the results? Sometimes we are looking for something and either find it, or not, but then are pleasantly surprised to find information we had no idea would be there. Sometimes there is information right before our eyes that we miss, until the relevance becomes evident at a later date.

May 5: Denise Bromley spoke on the subject "Filing is not the problem, retrieval is!" Denise spoke of the various software programs that are available: Family Tree Maker, Legacy and Reunion are three popular programs. She is currently using Legacy but has also used Family Tree Maker. Denise also gave handouts with examples of her filing system and suggestions about binders, files, dividers and labeling.

A Letter from Home (Dublin, Ireland) to Ottawa

There was a washing machine at the new house when we moved in but it

doesn't work too good. Last week I put in 14 shirts, pulled the chain, and haven't seen the shirts since.

Pictures: How important are they to genealogists?

As times change, habits change. In early times and lasting into the late 1900s, people used the postal system as the main means of communicating. Even in the 1800s letters were exchanged across continents bringing news from the "old country" to the new and vice versa. Letters brought news of family members, neighbors and local happenings and were often passed around to friends and other family members who were hungry for news about people and places known to them.

No less important were pictures, which parlayed information that even the best wordsmiths could not adequately describe. It is easy to say that your ancestors lived in a log, or wood, brick or sod house, but only a picture could give a true description of the dwellings, terrain, people and times they lived in, the clothing they wore, their physical features, family resemblances, etc.

You can often find pictures of people, records, gravestones and other images on Ancestry.ca as more and more people post images among their family trees. Data downloading has also provided a considerable amount of visual imagery from sites, such as Google Images, Peels Prairie Provinces, Manitobia, etc.

Although there seems to be more video and photographic imagery available these days (you can hardly take a breath without someone posting it on YouTube), much of this imagery is temporary and will soon be deleted.

People these days use email, Skype, cell phones, land lines, text messaging and other modern means of communication instead of the old postal system (now known as "snail mail"). Most of these messages are deleted soon after being read and few are printed for posterity. The days of finding treasure troves of old letters stored in the attic or under the bed, are rapidly disappearing and with people using digital cameras and storing information on hard drives, CDs, memory sticks, etc. old pictures are similarly becoming rare.

On the next page is a picture of an old family home. It is gone now and this may be the only existing picture. As families move or die out, old homes like this are torn down, vandalized, or fall apart, fading from memory and lost in time.

Several years ago I had the following query about Eaton homes. (Yes, Eatons did sell home packages).

"Where would I find a copy of Eaton home kit catalogue re: the plans for the house presented to Sam Larcombe by the T. Eaton Co. in 1929. Any info and plans I found on the internet was by American companies. Hope you can help me."

I was unable to find anything immediately available about this house and it went off my radar until I received an email from this same person and cleared up the mystery.....

"Since I emailed you I have found a source for some of Eaton home plans. Bernice Still came up with the plan for the Sam Larcombe home that the museum board was looking for to go with the display we have. The museum was given the first engraved key that was presented to Mr. Lancôme by T. Eatons after his home was built. Interesting stuff."

The folks from the Isabella district are very fortunate that SW Branch member Bernice Still is passionate about preserving local history, and is collecting and recording old buildings in the area. In its October-November, 2003 issue, the **Manitoba Historical Society** wrote of her that, "Bernice Still of Isabella for the past 25 years has been gathering photographs, artifacts and information on nearly 300 farm and rural houses and occupants in southwestern Manitoba. Most of the homes are found in Birtle, Hamiota and Virden and all over the RM of Miniota. Each home has been meticulously recorded with photographs, hand-drawn floor plans and information she collected from interviews with local residents. Some of the homes are no longer standing and Bernice Still's collection is the only source of information on them." Since that article appeared, she has brought that total to over 400.

As you drive through rural areas of the provinces, you will undoubtedly see old abandoned farm buildings, each with a history that has probably been lost in the crumbling ruins that once were alive with families who had their own stories complete with triumphs, tragedies and everything in-between. Somewhere there are pictures, documents, old letters and other memorabilia belonging to that family. Are they in your attic, photo albums, or files or are they decomposing in an old ash pile, local landfill or caught up in a bush among the old cream cans, rusting cars and other discarded trash?

One thing is certain. There are many changes in how our family history is recorded. The likelihood of finding boxes of old letters and pictures is becoming slimmer as time passes. Chances are that any future communications and photos will be found on computers, CDs, memory sticks and other electronic devices. As technology changes, it will be more difficult to recover this history and will present new challenges for future genealogists to find information that has not been documented on line.

As you enjoy travelling throughout the province this summer, you might think about taking pictures of some of the abandoned buildings that you see. It could be an interesting challenge to look into the history of those buildings and see what interesting stories they hold. If you don't uncover an interesting story, you can possibly use the pictures for artistic purposes.
